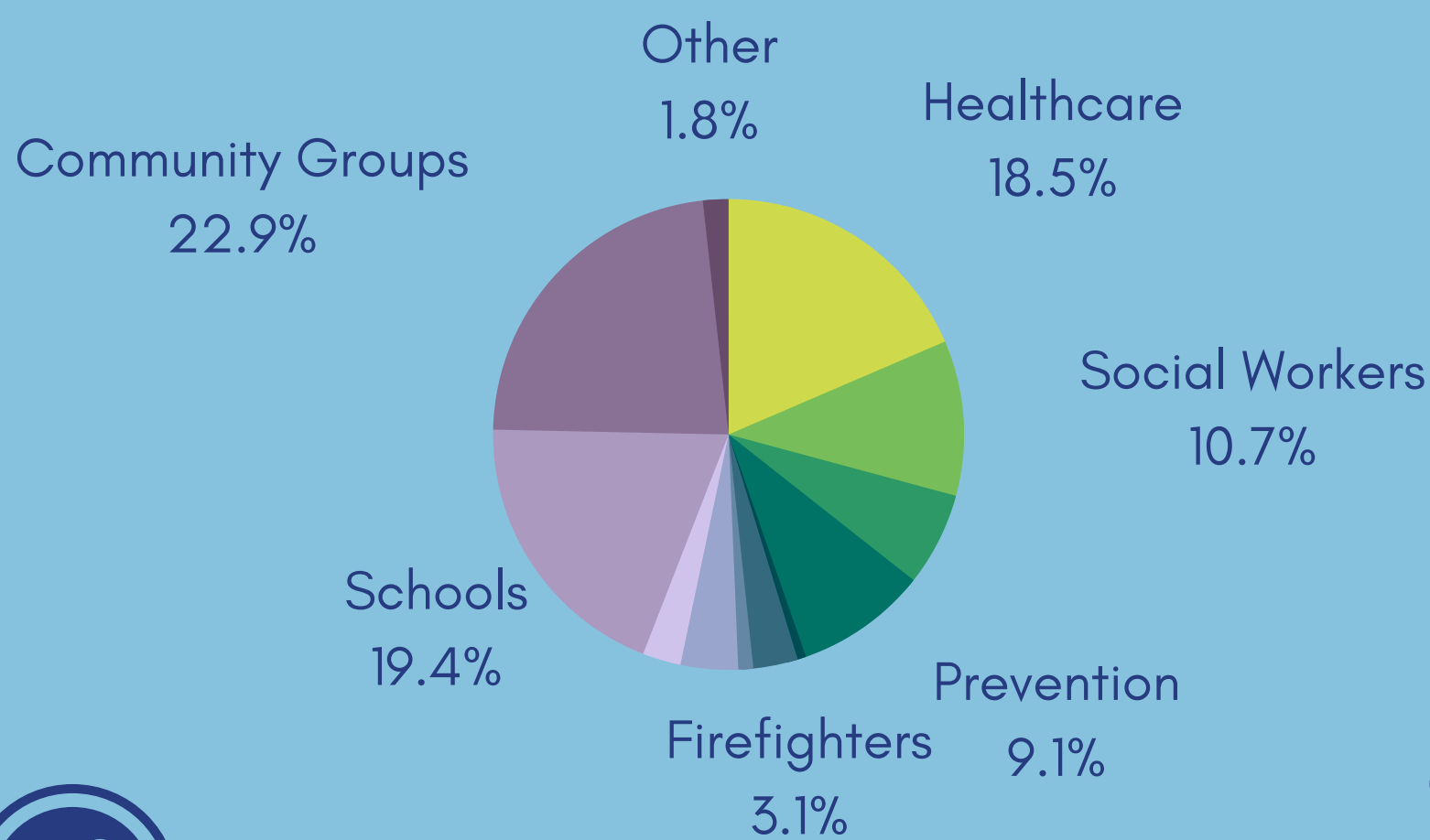

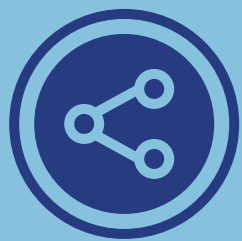
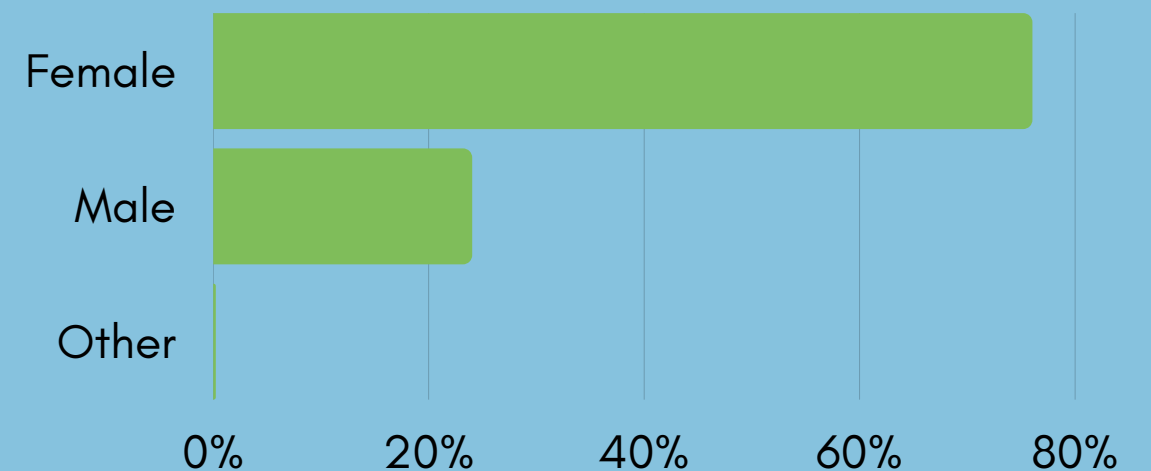

Post-training Survey Results

98% report an increase in knowledge about opioids

99% feel they can recognize the signs of an overdose if one were to happen in their presence

99% feel they have an increase in knowledge and skill to administer Narcan

Narcan Access



414 participants picked up Narcan at our offices or received it at an in-person training

121 participants indicated they would obtain Narcan elsewhere:

- 60** already had it at home or at work
- 46** would go to their local pharmacy
- 15** participated for education only

1,418 Narcan kits were distributed by WCTC

- New populations reached in the region include Public Defenders, Community-Based Reentry Services, and Older Adults
- We collaborated with CT Institute for Communities (CIFC), WCSU, NVCC, UConn and Post University, school districts, Fire and EMS, and with Local Prevention Councils.
- Educational resources were distributed with Narcan
- 84% of participants were from region 5
